

Senior Pastor's Report

2021 In Review And 2022 in Preview

Probably many of you have seen the movie Groundhog Day starring Bill Murray: Every day he wakes up, it's the same day once again – Groundhog Day – but he's the only one experiencing that. It's a brand-new day for everyone else.

I kind of feel like 2021, as a whole year and for the world (not just our church), was like that: pretty much the same as 2020.

And yet, there was a lot of great ministry that happened here at Rose Hill in 2021. Throughout this Annual Report your staff and other ministry leaders share what those things are. Many of them are ministries – both on-going and single events – that you undoubtedly participated in, prayed for, and certainly heard about this past year. A reminder of all the ways we have experienced God's goodness, grown as a community, and loved our neighbors is important. I hope you will take time to peruse through this.

As I look at the report myself, I am struck by the fact that none of what happened in 2021 would have been possible without the people of Rose Hill. Session Report

Brad Hurte and Jim Peterson Clerks of Session

Consider it all joy when you encounter various trials, like an ongoing pandemic, and continue to see God's hand in nurturing and protecting His Church! 2021 was a year in which we saw the lifting of many restrictions on corporate worship, by God's grace without suffering many setbacks. Session continues to provide discernment and leadership on how to safely gather, while providing for electronic means of worship for those who are vulnerable or not ready to come in person. As you'll read elsewhere in this annual report, Bible studies continue over Zoom, and some traditional small gatherings have resumed. We thank everyone for their prudent observance of safe practices in joining together and are

grateful for how God has continued to stimulate creative ideas for helping us stay engaged with each other. The traditional statistics-keeping role of the Clerk was challenging again this year. Inperson worship has ticked up, and it is encouraging to note that our various virtual ministries (worship services, VBS, etc.) have gotten over 6,000 views in the past year. We were blessed to admit five new Covenant Partners (members) to our ranks this year from folks who came to us during the pandemic, some of whom have used their gifts already in positions of leadership. We also said goodbye to some dear saints, some members but also some who were faithful parts of the Rose Hill family, who are now enjoying their eternal reward with Christ in heaven. We recorded one baptism.

We thank Elders Doug Ricard and Chris Seifert who stepped down in January after three years of service to Session. Doug felt led to accept nomination to the board of Deacons and was elected at the 2021 annual meeting. We also thank Brad Hurte and Pam Risinger-Hurte for their years of faithful service to the church as Clerk of Session and Finance Director, respectively. Their contributions have sustained Rose Hill Church in many ways for many years. We also welcome Dave Cram as Finance Director and Jim Peterson as Clerk of Session, both starting in October.

In 2020, Session took the step of taking Rob Mathis under its care in his process of ordination. Rob completed his final oral examination in December, having passed all of his written examinations earlier this year. He will be called to the position of Assistant Pastor for Congregational Care upon his ordination in January 2022. Congratulations Rob! We thank you for your faithful service to the Rose Hill family and look forward to an even richer relationship with you as an ordained pastor.

In 2020, Session decided to apply for a Payroll Protection Plan loan with the understanding that a large portion of the loan would be forgiven. Many thanks go to the Finance team of Pam Risinger-Hurte and Leslie Thompson for their diligent work in fulfilling the terms of the PPP loan agreement and its application for forgiveness.

Deacons' Report

Your Deacons' mission is to serve in three primary areas: Congregational Care, Community Outreach, and Prayer Ministry. Congregational Care involves many things, but basically it is bringing and keeping a sense of community amongst the congregation. During 2021 the COVID pandemic severely restricted our ability to visit people in person. Nevertheless, the Deacons made over 250 phone calls, made over 150 visits, and sent approximately 140 notes to those listed on our Prayer List.

Many more calls and visits were made to those not on our Prayer List. Because of COVID restrictions, we were not able to deliver as many flowers as we would have liked. In addition, your Deacons assisted in two abbreviated memorial services, and HomeTouch devotions were sent out every other week to about a dozen folks. And, as a final touch, for the second year in a row, the Deacons made and delivered home-made cookies to more than 20 congregants as a way to say "we love you" in these trying times. Rob Mathis, Minister of Congregational Care, though not included in the above figures, attended all our meetings and provided great support and guidance for all of the Deacons' efforts.

As part of our community outreach effort, our representative to the Woodinville Storehouse Food Bank was able to provide support in raising monies and food as well as assisting in delivering food to needy families. He also coordinated Rose Hill's efforts in supporting the Storehouse's backto-school supplies drive. During the Holidays, we were able to provide Thanksgiving and Christmas gift certificates to Rose Hill Elementary School families as well as to someone in the community. Jim and Jane Peterson again coordinated our Angel Tree giving to children of prison inmates. About half of each of the Deacons' meeting is spent on our Prayer List. This is vital to our ministry. We pray for those in the congregation in need of comfort and/or healing. We also offer praise for answered prayers. Please let a Deacon know if you or anyone you know would like to be included in the Deacons' Prayer List.

Looking Back at 2021

It is amazing to reflect on the different segments children's ministry has been in this past year. We started the year Zooming to Sunday School and having in-service worksheets so that kids could stay with their families. Early on this year, I couldn't imagine how we would apply all of the safety protocol into our program and get the kids back in their classes. Yet, we were able to do so in March. We brought the kids back into classes, and all of us, leaders and kids were so happy. We added children's ministry to the second service in September.

Vacation Bible School was well received. We had 300 kids sign up and handed out 200 bags with craft supplies. In the evening we did Zoom meetings that were really well received by the kids that came. On Friday, we had a live meeting where we sang together and had treats at the church! We had around 30 kids come with masks and vibrant energy. The kids learned about trusting Jesus, the love of Jesus, and following Jesus all week long.

We also had a trunk-or-treat event on October 30th where 600 people from our community came and played games, won prizes, and enjoyed fellowship. It was so fun to see the different costumes and celebrate life together. The response from the volunteers was so positive that this is going to be an annual event. 2021 was the second year of COVID restricted worship and meetings, but we still made the most of our times together. There were a number of hit and misses with planned youth outings for the year. Our outings outside of the building were very limited due to COVID restrictions. Earlier in the year we went up to Snoqualmie Pass for an arduous but fun youth family snowshoe outing. In May, Youth Sunday returned in a hybrid version, partially virtual and partially live. Most of the kids participated and led in some way, with a great video montage of youth messages and a special bass-solo performance— it was truly a heartwarming Sunday that also included great words from our wonderful youth.

Two other great events of note were "What-A-Water Day" at the church and the church family softball game. For the water day, I rented a large waterslide, a huge slip-and-slide, and I provided hundreds of water balloons, water pistols, icecream and loads of fun. This turned out to be a great community outreach on a beautiful sunny day that was attended very well, at least 30 kids with families from the community and also those that we had not seen due to COVID. The church family softball game was a very enjoyable gathering of at least 24 people all together on what turned out to be another beautiful Sunday despite the early threat of rain. I was encouraged to see so many of our church families hanging out together and having a good time after the past year and half of very little interaction.

Through the year all the way until the summer, we met exclusively on Wednesday evenings in the gym. Our format at that time was masked-up fellowship, a short devotional and then some worship. I was glad to have the consistency of meeting with the youth at those times and all the way until summer, we did not have a single COVID sickness in the youth group. During the summer time we headed outside and met at the lake in various parks, did a bike-ride, and a hiking trip. It was great for the kids to get together and go swimming or just hang out with each other outside chattina or throwing the football around.Summertime came and we had a areat camping trip planned, then COVID hit our group for the first time forcing us to cancel the trip. Thankfully, it only spread to one other person, an adult volunteer, and in both cases, the sickness was short-lived and very mild. Praise God that we avoided an outbreak and that neither case was extended or severe!

Moving into the fall, we made the decision to move back downstairs for the youth group, and pizza made its return. In addition, we started meeting on Sundays again. Throughout the summer and the fall to the end of the year, the youth group grew to 19 kids, with major additions from the Children's Ministry graduates and a few others from outside the church. Our average attendance on Wednesdays through the fall was about 14 kids not including adults.

The transition has had its challenges, especially with me not being onsite. But we are working on solving these challenges. Leslie Thompson, our bookkeeper, has done a wonderful job helping me through this transition.

Included in this annual report are the financial statements. Please review them. They show that Rose Hill Church continues to have a sound financial base. Please contact me if you have any questions about the church finances.

One need we have right now is a Financial Secretary. Barb Roetcisoender stepped down in 2020 and her position has not been filled. We are actively seeking a replacement as I write this. We also need to set up a regular offering count team again. It pretty much fell apart during the initial COVID period. Leslie and Lauren are currently doing the job, but that is far from satisfactory. It creates serious separation of duties issues. So, we are seeking volunteers to serve on a team to count the offering each week and deposit it in the bank.

One need we have right now is a Financial Secretary.

One of the blessings I've been able to assist with is the support of Foster Church. This is an ECO-Pres church plant in Edmonds being led by Dan and Krista Carlson. The Carlsons have been working on starting this church for the past two years pretty much alone. This during all the challenges of COVID. They now have a group of about 20 people meeting weekly. But with a group this small, it is difficult for them to get the administrative support they need. So, Session gave us permission to provide administrative support, including payroll and other oversight and guidance to them. Our goal is to assist the Carlson's in growing this church to a selfsustainable church body. You will hear more about this effort in the coming months.

DAN WOLFE Director of Facilities

Notable projects this year included:

- Overall Campus
 - January started with repairing bollards/ chains, sign and grass out front from an impaired driver. Had to drag each bollard with several hundred pounds of concrete and reset it in a hole and position them.
 - July we had a 2nd impaired driver miss the stop sign and hit the bollards and chains.
 We did the same repair, added more concrete to the holes this time! We knew what and how to do the repair since we had just fixed it 6 months previous.
 - o Remodel of bathrooms north of Sanctuary.
 - o Bus barn men's bathroom urinal flooded. Coordinated water removal and dry out.
 - o Replaced all the flat roofs on all the buildings with TPO membrane
 - o Repaired broken asphalt and curbing in parking lots
 - o Sealcoat and striping of parking lots
 - o Replaced furnace in attic by gym that had bad mother board, was under warranty
 - o Removed hazard trees by Professional Tree Service after storm that were falling and leaning, threatening Manse and Manse's neighbor's homes in November.
 - Coordinated with City of Kirkland, PSE and Potelco to repair transformer on west side of property to remove 3 cottonwood trees that had partially fallen or did fall on power lines in November.
 - Volunteer facility team removed branches and small trees that were leaning or had fallen on neighbors house just north of the Manse house. Manse's neighbors were thankful!!
 - Volunteer facility team removed hazard tree and limbed up branches on north end of parking lot in Summer ahead of parking coating work. We had to drop the tree on the parking lot.
- Preschool
 - o Shut down in March 2020 due to COVID-19

- Other Maintenance / Upgrades
 - o Lawn & Landscape Beds: Primrose & bulb plantings, weeding, trimming, reseeding and fertilizing;
 - o Irrigation System: replaced failed sprinklers and valve boxes;
 - Cleared off flat roofs and cleaned gutters in December after all the storms in November...there was a lot of debris!! Our team worked hard. It was a cold, wet, and messy job.
 - o Pest control performed for ants and bees.
 - o Fire and Security alarm testing
 - o Fire extinguisher maintenance
 - o Fire sprinkler testing
 - o Manse house cleaned off roof and gutters in Winter
 - o Cleared three drain outfalls in wetlands for drains from building to prevent basement flooding on west side of building.
 - o Located and cleared vegetation and sediment on two drain outfalls on north side of parking lot.
 - Continued measurement of trees, buildings and other objects on RoseHill Church property and Manse property with Bud VanDerAa. Bud is plotting the two properties to create a site plan to locate hazard trees. Also, to use site plan for AS-BUILTS for utilities, etc. It is 99% complete. Just need to locate on property corner. Having trouble locating it under a lot of vegetation and a few downed trees in the vicinity of where we believe the rebar pin to be located...next month's project.

Facilities Team

We are very thankful that no serious injuries occurred during on-site work at church the past year!

Facilities continues encouraging and welcoming volunteers of all ages/abilities who may like to participate – in any range of capacity and availability.

Facilities also experienced a large reduction in volunteer hours due to COVID-19, which kept people at home in 2020. We did witness an increase in volunteers the last 6 months as people were vaccinated and felt more comfortable participating. In the first 6 months we were operating on a "Triage", we basically addressed what was the most important/critical items on the list. For a small core group that showed up I am thankful and impressed that we were able to accomplish as much as we did...by the Grace of our Lord Jesus!!

It has been a pleasure to continue to serve Rose Hill Church and to work closely with so many amazingly faithful sisters and brothers in Christ. I am filled with gratitude for the outstanding work our Deacons accomplish, especially with COVID continuing to flare up and challenge our sense of "what should be right in the world."

The early part of 2021 saw a great need for help in assisting our shut-ins, elders and significantly ill parishioners. The Lord has provided many precious people to assist in finding new ways to bring light to this particular group of our congregation. We worked diligently to locate vaccinations for our people and then to arrange transport to sometimes distant venues to begin

the COVID vaccination process for those desirous of this. We then followed up with transportation for second shots and even boosters by near year's end. As a result of the support and help of many in our congregation we have seen almost no negative medical impact of COVID on these vaccinated folks.

As life began to open up some in the early summer we found that some of our more secluded parishioners desperately wanted to spend time outside and with others in safe environments. We have been able to bring several folks together during the summer to spend quality time outside, fellowshipping with other congregants, including having meals together, and taking some on hikes and drives in the country. Even though we continue to struggle as a nation as to how to address the myriad of challenges COVID has brought upon us all, I am seeing our people find creative, loving and merciful ways to agree on things we agree on and to support one another in prayer, with visits, with cards and letters and emails and texts and calls.
